St. Mark Lutheran Church glorifies God and makes disciples by making caring connections with the people of our community.


“One Body”

For an eye to be able to see, the forty basic components which make it up need to be present at the same time and work together perfectly. The lens is only one of these. If all the other components, like the cornea, iris, pupil, retina, and eye muscles are all present and functioning properly, but just the eyelid is missing, then the eye will shortly suffer serious damage and stop working. If all the subsystems exist but tear production stops, the eye will dry up and go blind within a few hours. The different parts need each other, and when everything works, a person has vision, without having to try. Take one part away, though, and there's trouble.

There are many ways that the Bible talks about the Church. One of the most profound is the one that Saint Paul uses in Romans. He writes, “We, though many, are one body in Christ, and individually members of one another.” Do you understand yourself as being part of something bigger than yourself? Since you are part of this body—or else you wouldn't be reading this right now—do you know what your function is within this body?

Thinking of ourselves as parts of a singular body is a challenge. It goes against the grain of how we normally like to operate. Our culture honors the rugged individual and cheers for the person who says, ‘right or wrong, I did it my way.’ But the culture of Christ and the Word of God take us in a much different direction. The Bible honors our individuality—we are uniquely created and adopted one by one in the waters of baptism—and yet we are never *just* an individual. Paul says, “We, though many, are one body in Christ.” Because we are baptized and believe in Christ, we are part of something beyond ourselves. Together, we play a part in presenting Jesus Christ to our world. Paul writes, “We, though many, are one body in Christ, and individually members one of another.” What do you think it means to be “members of one another”—especially during this era of social distancing? What should the one body of Christ be doing during this time?

The Lord's Gift of Giving

Through His graceful touch the Lord blesses each of us to give of ourselves in various ways. This column highlights members of the congregation and the joy they have experienced in giving of themselves.

Bruce and Donna Robinson have been members of St. Mark for about eleven years. She is involved in a wide variety of activities including Women's League events and the Board of Stewardship. Bruce is an usher on Sundays. He also does repairs around the church and easily finds light bulbs to change, as well as pencils or knives to sharpen. "If you look, there is always something to be done."

Bruce and Donna are active with the monthly community lunches. Now in its tenth year, the lunch has grown from a handful of attendees to an average of 80 to 90. Donna finds that it helps us "make caring connections with the community." Bruce states that it is

an opportunity for the men to be "the men's auxiliary" to the women by setting up the chairs and tables and assisting with clean ups. Both are excited and proud to be members of a congregation that is growing it in its outreach to the community.

When asked how does the Holy Spirit move you to give back to the Lord and in giving back, what does this bring into your life, Bruce quickly responded, "It brings satisfaction. We have been blessed with opportunities to give back time, talent, and treasure." Donna commented that her activities have become "a natural extension for me to choose to be a light to the world, to choose to be a disciple." She believes "if each of us answers the Holy Spirit's call and does 'something', God can use it for His glory."

Bruce and Donna agree, "it is easy to be generous because the Lord has been so generous to us. We experience great joy in finding new and creative ways to serve."

When the outside door closes behind you, give it a tug to insure that it has latched. We appreciate you help ensuring that our building stays safe.



There is a food pantry box in St. Mark's mailbox room where you may place your donated non-perishable food items. God bless your generosity.




Paper Recycling
